

### ABDON PALLASCH TO SPEAK AT JANUARY MEETING

Our speaker for the January meeting will be Abdon Pallasch, who is now Pat Quinn's assistant budget director. Abdon was a frequent panelist on Channel 11's "Chicago Tonight" program. He was a reporter at the *Sun-Times*.

After 13 years as ace political reporter at the Sun-Times — and 25 years in journalism altogether — Pallasch, 46, is crossing over to work for Governor Pat Quinn as assistant budget director for the state. What made Quinn's offer appealing was the challenge of putting his budget expertise into practice. "In addition to being spokesman for the office, I hope to be able to have a positive impact on coming up with solutions for the state's budget problems," Pallasch told me. "At the very least I'm confident it will be a learning experience for me to walk through the looking glass and see the process I've been covering from the other side."

Steeped in local news and politics, Pallasch grew up on the Northwest Side and graduated from the Medill School of Journalism at Northwestern University. After stints at Chicago's City News Bureau, UPI and the *Chicago Lawyer* (along with a four-year detour at the *Tampa Tribune*), he joined the *Chicago Tribune* in 1998 and jumped to the Sun-Times the following year.

Of his many scoops and blockbusters, Pallasch considers the most memorable his early reporting on the political phenomenon of Barack Obama: "I was in the right place at the right time to ride that Obama bus through lowa and see all those lowa people become believers, then follow him on to New Hampshire and a dozen other states," he re-



called. "Back when I was at *Chicago Lawyer* magazine in the '90s and needed a constitutional law expert, he was on my speed dial."

Pallasch called leaving the *Sun-Times* "a very tough choice," adding: "I really like my job. I worked hard to get here. I think it's very important work we do, especially at election time to give readers the information they need to make informed choices.

"Like most Americans who don't work for political action committees, I really lament the Balkanizing, fracturing, dismissive attitudes partisans increasingly take toward each other. I tried very hard in my reporting to do a balanced job reporting elections on policy disputes between the parties and to maintain a good rapport with Democrats and Republicans. I hope to do the same looking for budget solutions at the state," he said.

#### POLAND BIDDING FOR 2020 EURO GAMES

Poland will endeavor to be one of the organizers of the Euro 2020 football (soccer) championship, Prime Minister Donald Tusk said on December 7, 2012. According to a media report, the Union of European Football Associations (UEFA) decided that the Euro 2020 event will take place in several countries simultaneously. Prime Minister Tusk added that the most likely candidate was the Polish capital Warsaw.

# THE POLISH AIR FORCE IN WORLD WAR II

The Polish Museum of America in Chicago and the Polish Air Force Veterans Association (Stow. Lotników Polskich) invite you to an exhibit "The Polish Air Force in World War II." The exhibit highlights the exploits of Polish squadrons who first were overwhelmed by the Luftwaffe in September 1939 and later in France in 1940. During the Battle of Britain they were the highest scoring group of pilots among the "few" who saved Britain and possibly Western civilization during the dark days of the German Luftwaffe's "blitz" in WWII. The PAF then moved on the offensive and was on the winning side.



The opening of the exhibit will take place on Saturday, January 19, 2013 from 3:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. in the Great Hall of the Polish Museum of America. General admission to the opening is \$10; veterans and PMA members paying \$5. Light refreshments will be served. The exhibit will be on view until February 24, 2013.

### Low Polish Inflation

As expected, Polish inflation lowered in year-on-year terms in November, dropping to 2.8%, the lowest figure in two years. Month-on-month prices grew merely 0.1%, largely thanks to a huge drop in gas prices. The bright inflation outlook opens then the door for an even more aggressive easing of the NBP monetary policy.

# **FUN FACTS**

Pieorgi (few remember that the singular is pieróg, probably because so few of us will

eat only one!) have a Patron Saint, and it has been confirmed: St. Hyacinth (Swięty Jacek), of the early 13<sup>th</sup> Century, has that honor. Here's a fact that will pique your attention: St. Hyacinth was a man. He was a son of aristocracy in Śląsk, a region of Poland between Wrocław and Kraków. He met and was the first Polish member of the St. Dominic "Order of Preachers," becoming known as the "Second Apostle of



Poland" as he was conducting his travels through Lithuania, the Ukraine and Russia. Legend has it that he created pierogi as his way of providing filling food to the starving at a time of famine.

#### FOLKLORE OF POLAND

This year, let's take a "tour of Poland" by exploring her various folkloric regions. Ethnographically, Poland is divided into five macro-regions. These regions are *Wielkopolska*, *Małopolska*, *Pomorze*, *Mazowsze*, *Śląsk*. Their exact borders cannot be drawn, as the regions are not official political or administrative units. Each of these regions has its unique culture, such as country traditions, lifestyle, costumes, music and songs, tales, dialect, etc.

#### Wielkopolska (Greater Poland)

The Wielkopolska region is a flat region interspersed with forests and lakes. Located in the Warta River basin, it was the home of the Polanie tribe, an ancient Slavic tribe from which the Polish nation arose. In its center lies Gniezno, an ancient castle town built in the eighth century and Poland's first capital. Wielkopolska, sometimes called the "cradle of Poland," formed the heart of the 10<sup>th</sup>-century early Polish state. Poznań and Gniezno were early centers of royal power; historians believe that this is where Mieszko, Poland's first historical ruler, was baptized in 966. Other cities in the region include Kalisz and Konin,

#### Małopolska (Little Poland)

The *Wiślanie* (Vistulans), a Slavic tribe, lived along the upper Vistula River basin near Kraków. Kraków itself became Poland's capital in 1038. The royal residence was on Wawel hill overlooking the town. On it still stands the remains of a 10<sup>th</sup> century church. Additionally, archeological evidence indicates that under the foundations of the 10<sup>th</sup> century Church of St. Wojciech (Adalbert) in

the town's main square are the remains of a pagan temple. It is a region of gently rolling hills and green valleys The area associated with this name is quite large, stretching from Częstochowa in the west to Lublin in the east and encompassing the land between this line and the mountain ranges forming Poland's southern border. Other cities include Rzeszów, Tarnów, and Sącz

#### Pomorze (Pomerania)

The Pomorze region lies on the south shore of the Baltic Sea. Divided between Germany and Poland, it stretches roughly from the Recknitz River near Stralsund in the West, via the Oder River delta near Szczecin, to the mouth of the Vistula River near Gdańsk in the East. Outside its few urban centers—most notably the Szczecin and Trójmieście metropolitan areas—the soil is mostly used as farmland, dotted with numerous lakes, forests, and small towns. Agriculture primarily consists of raising livestock, forestry, fishery and the cultivation of cereals, sugar beets, and potatoes.

#### Mazowsze (Mazovia)

The historical region of Mazowsze is situated along the middle course of the Vistula River. The historical capital of Mazowsze is Płock, being the oldest town in this region. It received its town rights in 1237. It is the former residence of the Mazovian princes. A part of the country at its inception, it became a separate principality that was incorporated back into Poland in 1529. Mazowsze is a low-lying region. During the 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> centuries the region began exporting grain, timber, and fur. Two-thirds of the province's residents live in cities, with the most living in Warsaw, the nation's capital. Other large cities include Radom, Płock, and Siedlce. The latter part of the 19th century saw rapid development of agriculture, the food, metal, and textile industries, and railway transport.

#### Śląsk (Silesia)

Śląsk is an area of southwestern Poland stretching along the Czech border. This area was part of Poland up to the 14<sup>th</sup> century after which it passed successively into Czech, Austrian, Prussian and eventually German hands. With the passage of time, the Polish-speaking population of the region became increasingly Germanized, more so further West. Upper Silesia's rich deposits of coal have resulted in the area becoming highly industrialized. Silesia is rich in mineral and natural resources and includes several important industrial areas. Silesia's largest city and historical capital is Wrocław. Other large cities are Opole, Gliwice, and Katowice.

In the next months, we'll take a look at each of these regions in more depth, and how its geography, history, and politics have influenced the folkloric characteristics unique to the region.

# PNA Assists Needy Children at Christmas with Annual Toy Drive

The Polish National Alliance held its annual toy drive for needy children from Novem-

ber through December 7<sup>th</sup>, 2013. A large decorated carton stood in the lobby of the Home Office for donations from PNA employees and guests as they entered the building. The PNA affiliates—the two PNA Bank locations (Niles and South Pulaski Avenue in Chicago) and the Polish Daily News (*Dziennik Związkowy*)—also participated in the toy drive with drop off boxes in their buildings. This year the donations were the most we have received in the past few years.

# **POLISH TRIVIA**

This event began 150 years ago, on January 22, 1863, in the former Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth. It began as a spontaneous protest by young Poles against conscription into the Imperial Russian Army, and was soon joined by high-ranking Polish-Lithuanian officers and various politicians. It ended in 1864. As a direct result of the Poles' defeat, all traces of the former Polish autonomy were removed. Russian also became the official language of the country, used exclusively in all offices of the general and local government. What was this historical event?

Answer to December's question: The oldest Polish Christmas carol or *kolęda*, dates from 1424 and begins with the words "*Zdrów bądź*, *królu anjelski*" ("Be healthy, King of angels").
